

### Ping and Woof Opera

At our January luncheon, Jocelyn Claire Thomas and Zachary Lenox performed scenes from **La Boheme**. Both are performing in the upcoming production of **LaBoheme** at OperaBend, which will include full orchestra and the Cascade Chorale. Tickets for the MARCH 10 and 11 performances in Redmond and MARCH 12 in Madras are at **operabend.org** 

Ping & Woof Opera will next appear locally in performances of **Stabat Mater** by Giovanni Battista Pergolesi, March 15 & 16 at St Peter and Paul Episcopal Church, 247 SE 82nd Ave., Portland, and March 17th at St. John the Baptist Episcopal Church, 6300 SW Nicol Road, Portland.

This lovely work was originally scored for soprano and alto soloists, violins I and II and basso continuo, and was written by Pergolesi during his final weeks in 1736. The **Stabat Mater** is one of Pergolesi's most celebrated sacred works, achieving great popularity after the composer's death. Jean-Jacques Rousseau praised the work, and described the opening movement as "the most perfect and touching duet to come from the pen of any composer." Admission to these concerts is by donation at the door.

### Portland State Opera Spring Production

One of the programs your Opera Guildis proud to support is that of Portland State University Opera. We are fortunate to have PSU opera students sing for us each December at our Holiday celebration. And, this March, at our Spring Luncheon, Professor Christine Meadows will bring several of her talented singers to perform excerpts from Puccini's one-act operas, *Gianni Schicci* and *Suor Angelica*.

Indeed, the Portland State Spring Opera is always a welcome event in the Rose City; there's no surer sign that winter has ended! All performances of the Puccini duo will take place in PSU's fabulous Lincoln Performance Hall: at 7:30 pm on April 21, 25, 28, and 29 and at 3 pm at the April 23rd and 30th matinees. Tickets are \$30 per adult, \$25 for seniors, and \$17 for students and can be purchased online at **pdx.edu/boxoffice** or calling (503) 725-3307.

### The Met in High Definition

Six completed; four remaining (in the 2016-17 Season) – that's the Metropolitan Opera's HD productions, shown in movie theaters to audiences around the world. Four cinemas in our area, two in Portland, one each in Clackamas and Beaverton, carry these live from the Met broadcasts. All Saturday broadcasts begin at 10 am (PST), unless otherwise noted, and are repeated on the following Wednesday at 6:30 pm.

### **Broadcast Schedule**

March 11: Verdi's *La Traviata* – Sonya Yoncheva, Michael Fabiano, and Thomas Hampson sing the leads in Verdi's tragic, but magnificent opus;

March 25: Mozart's *Idomeneo* (King of Crete) – Here's an opportunity to see one of Mozart's less-known operas. James Levine conducts a fabulous cast.

April 22: Tchaikovsky's *Eugene Onegin*. You won't want to miss the great **Anna Ntrebko's** portrayal of Tatiana in this, surely the composer's most popular opera.

May 13 (9:30 am): Richard Strauss's **Der Rosenkavalier** – See **Renée Fleming, Elina Garanĉa, and Matthew Polenzani** in this sumptuous German classic (with an Italian-singing character).

# Meet Portland Opera's 2017 Resident Artists

Many Opera Guild members will admit that their favorite aspect of any Portland Opera Season, and the one worthiest of Guild support, is the Company's Resident Artist Program. Indeed, watching these young singers mature as artists and people, and realizing that they are the future of the art form we love so much, is so very rewarding!

For the 2017 Season, Portland Opera will feature four Resident Artists, two men returning for a second season, and two new female singers. All four sang superbly in the recently completed "Songs of Love and War" by Claudio Monteverdi at the Hampton Center and will appear in the Big Night Concert at the Keller on April 8th. They all will appear in Man of La Mancha this June and will sing the leading roles in Mozart's Cosi fan tutte during six shows at the Newmark in July. Only the tenor and baritone will sing in La Bohème this May, but an alumnus of the program, soprano Jennifer Forni, will sing Musetta in Puccini's popular opera. One of the highlights of the 2016 Season was Ms. Forni's wonderful Tatiana in Eugene Onegin last summer.

Our returning baritone, **Ryan Thorne**, advanced from the MONC Oregon Auditions last October when selected by the panel of judges while tenor **Aaron Short** was brilliant as Lenskii in *Onegin* last summer. Mr. Short recently returned to Portland for the new Season with his new bride, Clarissa.

Those of us who witnessed last October's Auditions at PSU got our first look at lyric soprano **Antonia Tamer,** who, like Mr. Thorne, advanced as one of the competition's winners. She comes to us from Boston after recently completing a Masters in Voice at the San Francisco Conservatory of Music. Our new mezzo-soprano is **Kate Farrar.** Ms. Farrar is a native of North Carolina where she was a winner of the MONC competition in 2014. Most recently, she sang the title role of Rossini's *La Cenerentola* with Saratoga Opera.

## Northwest Regional Auditions Held in Seattle

Neither snow, nor rain, nor sleet...leads the Metropolitan Opera National Council (MONC) to cancel or postpone Northwest Regional Auditions. So, despite the freezing rain in our area that began the evening before, the "show" went on in Seattle's Benaroya Hall on Sunday, January 8th. Ten talented young singers representing four Districts: (all of) Canada, the Montana-Idaho Region,

the Washington and Oregon Regions, competed for prize money and the right to advance to the Semi-Finals in New York in March. Two of our own Resident Artists, soprano **Antonia Tamer** and baritone **Ryan Thorne**, who had advanced from the Oregon Auditions the previous October, made the trip up to Seattle to participate.

Ms. Tamer, who has joined the Portland Opera Resident Artist Program this year, began by singing the same aria that she had started with at PSU last October, "Das wahr so gut" ("This was very good") from Richard Strauss's Arabella. The judges then asked her to perform Donna Elvira's "Ah, fuggi il traditor" ("Beware this wicked man") from Mozart's Don Giovanni. Mr. Thorne began with Valentin's aria from Faust, "Avant de quitter ces lieux" ("Before leaving this place") and was asked by the judges to sing Argante's "Sibilar gli angui d'Aletto" ("All around I seem to hear") from Gounod's Faust. It was reported that both acquitted themselves splendidly.

The judges selected soprano Pascale Spinney, a member of Atelier lyrique de l'Opèra de Montrèal. As first-prize winner, Ms. Spinney will go to the National Semi-Finals in New York on March 12 where she will compete with the winners of 12 other Regional Auditions and receive coaching from the Met's artistic staff.

### Susan Graham to Sing In Portland This April

Truly one of the opera world's greatest and most beloved singers, mezzo-soprano **Susan Graham** will perform in Portland on Sunday afternoon, April 9. Accompanied by the equally renowned keyboardist, **Malcolm Martineau**, the concert will take place in PSU's Lincoln Hall beginning at 3 pm.

Ms. Graham, along with Renee Fleming and Ben Heppner, were among the Metropolitan Opera National Council (MONC) Winners in New York in April, 1988. From then until now, the Texas native has appeared on most of the world's major opera stages and concert halls. Her interpretation of French music and German lieder has also earned her critical admiration. Indeed, Ms. Graham was awarded the French government's prestigious "Chevalier de la Légion d'Honneur" for her popularity as a performer in France and in honor of her commitment to French music. Gramophone magazine has dubbedher "America's favorite mezzo."

How very fortunate we Portlanders are that *Friends of Chamber Music* (FOCM) is insistent on bringing the world's greatest operatic voices to our city year after year. Already, last December, FOCM brought German baritone, Christian Gerhaher, with pianist Gerold Huber, to town to sing an all-Mahler concert. Anyone who was there will tell you how special that day was!

Robert Schumann's song cycle Frauenliebe und Leben: Variations (A Woman's Love and Life), "will serve as the impetus and inspiration for an incredible varied program musically, dramatically, and stylistically."

To better acquaint concert-goers with the songs that Ms. Graham will sing in her program, FOCM is offering a three-session class (7:30-9 pm: March 15, 22, and April 5) conducted by Opera for the Hesitant founder, Musicologist **Theresa Koon.** These classes

offer live performances by local mezzo-soprano Hannah Penn and pianist Susan McDaniel.

The recital is certain to be a sell-out so you'll want to get your ticket(s) now: go to <u>www.focm.org</u> or call (503) 224-9842, where you can also register for the classes. In addition, Ms. Koon will be on hand to give a pre-concert lecture on April 9.

The day after Ms. Graham's recital, on Monday, April 10, she will conduct a Master Class for at least two of the current Portland Opera Resident Artists, one of PSU's Opera Program students, and the winner of the recent NATS (National Association of Teachers of Singing) at the Hampton Opera Center at 12 noon. This exciting offering is open to the public at no charge!

### Portland Opera's 2017 Season

Subscriptions and tickets for individual operas are still available for all performances of Portland Opera during its 2017 Season (except a concert of "Songs of Love and War" by Claudio Monteverdi, which will have completed its run in February). An annual, one performance only of **Big Night** will take place at the Keller on Saturday evening, April 8. Come hear many of opera's greatest hits, performed by our Resident Artists and other stellar voices along with the Portland Opera Chorus and Orchestra.

Perhaps opera's most beloved and performed opus, Puccini's La Boheme will have four performances at the Keller, on May 5, 7 (m), 11, and 13. The great American musical that won five Tony Awards, Man of La Mancha, will undoubtedly fill all the Keller seats during its four June performances, on the 9th, 11th (m), 15th, and 17th. Mozart's profoundly beautiful comic opera, Cosi Fan Tutte, will be performed at the more intimate Newmark Theater on six July dates: 14, 16 (m), 20, 22, 26, and 29. All the major roles in Cosi will be performed by four Resident Artists! Concluding the season, also at the Newmark, will be two short, but wonderful works by the American composer David Lang: The Difficulty of Crossing a Field and The Little Match Girl Passion. Lang's music is paired with the creative direction of Imago Theatre's Artistic Co-Director Jerry Mouawad.
